Tribute to Liberty Requests a Change to the NCC’s Policy Regarding On-Site Donor Recognition

Many of Tribute to Liberty’s donors and potential donors have asked why there can be no donor recognition at the memorial site. According to the National Capital Commission’s (NCC’s) *Comprehensive Commemoration Program and Policy for Canada’s Capital*, “Donor contributions to the commemoration, whether financial or other, shall not be acknowledged in any manner as part of the commemorative site.”

Tribute to Liberty recently participated in an evaluation of the NCC’s commemoration program and raised the issue of on-site donor recognition. The NCC responded by saying they would look into the issue.

Tribute to Liberty is hopeful the NCC will change its policy regarding on-site donor recognition as it wants to be able to recognize donors at the memorial site.

Update on Tribute to Liberty’s Canadian Heritage Grant Application

Tribute to Liberty has applied for funding through *Commemorate Canada*, a component of Canadian Heritage’s *Celebrate and Commemorate Program*.

The application is under review and the outcome and amount of funding is TBD.

“*Commemorate Canada* provides grants and contributions to eligible recipients for celebrations and commemorations of national significance” (Canadian Heritage website).

History Unhidden

The Vietnamese Community in Canada - Escape from Communism

Before 1975, one could argue that Canada did not have a community of Vietnamese people. Some of the reasons for this may have included the following:

1. Vietnamese people usually clung firmly to their roots and rarely left the country. Even those who chose to study abroad opted for more popular destinations such as France, the United States of America, England or Australia.
2. The climate in Canada is cold and often inhospitable for those used to warm tropical environments.

After the events of April 30th 1975, Vietnamese people left the country en masse to seek refuge from communism, the diaspora led people all over the world. During that time Canada opened its doors to refugees and many Vietnamese. It was from this that those who came to live in this free democratic country coined the saying “Canada’s lands are cold but Canada’s love is warm.”



As more and more people immigrated to Canada the Vietnamese population increased to 150,000 at the beginning of the 21st century. By now, the number may have reached up to 200,000. Excluding European-Canadians, the Vietnamese community has the fifth-largest population in Canada, after those from China, India, the Philippines, and Jamaica.

The Vietnamese community in Canada:

- Owes its origin to refugees that sought a safe haven from communism. A massive exodus occurred in

Vietnam following the Communist attacks of April 30, 1975.

- Is still young, having been first established after 1975.
- Still suffers from strict communism in its native country. The communist regime does not allow for freedom of religion, politics, culture, thought or media.
- Continues to be affected and stereotyped by the actions of Communist Vietnam.
- Has chosen the original pre-communism Vietnamese flag, three horizontal red stripes on a yellow background, to be its logo, an action shared by other immigrant Vietnamese communities around the world.

To show appreciation for their adopted homeland, Vietnamese-Canadians work hard in their chosen careers, strive to fulfill their responsibilities as citizens, respect the laws of Canada and contribute to the positive growth of the country in general. These core values and beliefs are dutifully passed on from one generation to the next. As a result, Vietnamese-Canadians of all generations can be found in many fields, including science, literature, media and athletics. Those individuals fortunate enough to live in Canada continue to help those still living in hardship in Vietnam through financial donations, medicinal aid, etc.



Vietnamese-Canadians have never forgotten the crimes perpetrated by Communists in Vietnam since 1945. Millions of innocent lives have been lost. The systematic change in land ownership laws in 1956 resulted in the deaths of over 200,000 people alone. To this day, activists who are not killed for voicing their opinions are thrown in prison by the Communist party.

The Vietnamese Community in Canada has contributed greatly to Tribute to Liberty in the hopes of erecting a memorial to the victims of Communism in Ottawa. The Statue Committee of the Vietnamese community was established in Toronto in 2010. The committee has published many articles in Vietnamese newspapers and magazines, as well as appearing on local Vietnamese television to ask for donations. Furthermore, an event was held on May 29, 2010 to raise awareness and funds for the cause. So far, the Statue Committee has contributed

\$26,842 Canadian dollars and \$730 US dollars to Tribute to Liberty.

The Vietnamese community in Canada may be relatively small compared to other communities, but it has rallied to the cause of building the memorial in Ottawa. The memorial will serve as a reminder of the suffering caused by Communist regimes, as well as serve as a warning to avoid such mistakes in the future.

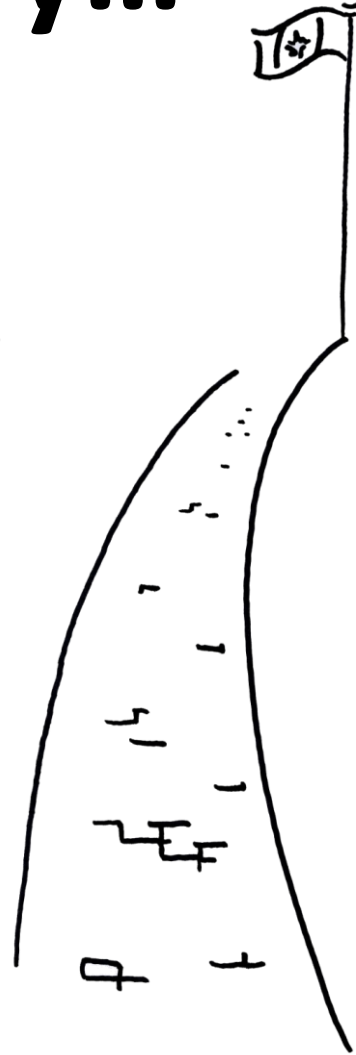
