Tribute to Liberty Christmas Party

Tribute to Liberty held its inaugural event on December 10, 2008 at the Faculty Club of the University of Toronto Mississauga. Friends and supporters of the project gathered to meet and discuss the project, and to enjoy some holiday cheer.



Reet Marten Sehr, a member of the Tribute to Liberty Board, gave a Power Point presentation about Tribute to Liberty. It included a call for support from all the communities in Canada that have been affected by Communism in their countries of origin.

Greetings from The Honourable Jason Kenney, P.C., M.P., Minister of Citizenship, Immigration and Multiculturalism were read. Minister Kenney had been scheduled to attend the event until bad weather in Ottawa caused delays that prevented his participation.

Minister Kenney's greetings for the evening were: *Although I cannot be with you, I would like to extend my warmest greetings to those attending the Tribute to Liberty Christmas Party. On behalf of Prime Minister Stephen Harper, I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the members of Tribute to Liberty for spreading awareness about the many great historical injustices perpetrated by Communist regimes.*

I was proud to be a member of the parliament that unanimously voted to recognize November 22nd as Ukrainian Famine and Genocide Memorial Day. Recognizing the Holodomor, and other such atrocities, as acts of genocide expresses the fundamental values of democracy, freedom and the rule of law that all Canadians embrace. By increasing awareness of historical injustices and atrocities, we are able to help ensure that they will not be repeated. I hope that you can take this opportunity to reflect on the meaningful work that Tribute to Liberty has undertaken so far. Thank you for your efforts in shining a light on these dark periods of history that have affected so many.

Representatives from many of the project's supportive communities were in attendance, including Polish, Czech, Chinese, Vietnamese, Korean, Cuban, Armenian, Estonian, Latvian, Mennonite, and Ukrainian communities.



Several dignitaries were present, including: Richard Krpac, Consul General for the Czech Republic; Laas Leivat, Honorary Consul General for the Republic of Estonia; and Andrzej Krężel, Consul for the Republic of Poland. Mr. Krężel spoke to the group, expressing his deep enthusiasm and support for the project. Tribute to Liberty plans on having another event in the spring.

NCC Proposal Submitted!

In early January 2009 Tribute to Liberty submitted its proposal to the National Capital Commission (NCC) to build a memorial in Ottawa to the Victims of the Crimes of Communism. The NCC is the government agency that oversees the use and development of National Capital Region lands.

Thank you to all who provided letters of support for the proposal—each and every letter submitted makes more evident the strength of purpose this project has.

Advisory Council Established

Tribute to Liberty is now establishing an Advisory Council. The Council's role is to bring to the table the range of perspectives and experiences from people affected by the Crimes of Communism—victims, observers, descendants, commentators—individuals who can ensure that the memorial has the most fulsome expression of the struggle for liberty that

The Advisory Council is made up of representatives of the many different communities in Canada whose members trace their roots to countries affected by Communism.

The Council will play an integral role in engaging these communities in support of the project, and in support of our longer term objective of educating Canadians about the historical record and what we must learn from it. Screening of Korean Film Crossing

On December 29, 2008 the first feature film on the refugee crisis in North Korea had its premiere screening at the Garden Church in North York. The screening was organized by The Council for Human Rights in North Korea.

Based on the life of a North Korean defector and his family, director Kim Tae Gyun's film gives an account of the hardships of North Korean refugees as they flee famine and persecution.



Alide Forstmanis, Board Chair of Tribute to Liberty, spoke at the screening. Her remarks that evening were: *On behalf of Tribute to Liberty I'd like to thank Mr. Kyung Bok Lee for this opportunity to raise funds for Tribute to Liberty. Further, I'd*

like to thank Mr. Lee and the Korean community for giving other communities a chance to get more informed about the poor human rights conditions in North Korea. Also, I'd like to thank Mr. Lee for his generosity and hospitality and for this real step in cooperating with other communities with a similar history and common goal.

Tribute to Liberty's objective is to have a memorial to victims of Communist crimes built in Ottawa within 2 years. The reason is many victims are elderly, in their 80's and up, and need to be able to experience Canada's recognition of their sufferings. Younger Canadians need to get informed about the Crimes of Communism. With a memorial in place and educational materials available ministries of education and school boards should have the means to include teachings about the Crimes of Communism in history curricula.

Let us never forget that three-quarters of all crimes against humanity have been committed by communist regimes.

A portion of the proceeds from the evening was donated to Tribute to Liberty to have the memorial to the Victims of the Crimes of Communism built in Ottawa. Thanks to all who attended for their generous support of the project!




The performances were presented by the Falun Dafa Association of Toronto and New Tang Dynasty Television (Toronto).

History Unhidden

How One Canadian Soldier Saved the Lives of Thousands: A Story of Forced Repatriation Blocked

Why certain parts of history are well known and others are not is complicated and often involves a web of politics and power struggles that is difficult to untangle. One thing is clear, however: there are stories of both horror and heroism that need to be told. History Unhidden is one, small voice in the telling of what happened during Communism—the extent of the crimes, as well as the contributions of those who were willing to stand up for the Truth.

The story of how a Canadian soldier saved thousands of Slovenians from being brutalized by Tito's Communist partisans at the end of World War II is known by only a handful of Canadians.

In May 1945 Major Paul Barre, a 38-year-old Canadian soldier from Quebec serving with the Allied Military Government for Occupied Territories (AMGOT), was in charge of a civilian refugee camp in Viktring, Austria. There were 6,000 Slovenians in the camp who had fled Tito's Communist forces, seeking and finding refuge in the British held part of Austria.

These Slovenians—12,000 soldiers and 6,000 civilians in all—were seen as enemies of the state because of their wartime resistance to Tito and his Partisans; the refugees suspected that remaining in or being sent back to Yugoslavia meant certain death. However, these refugees were unaware of the Yalta Conference.



At the end of World War II the big three Allied powers drew up secret agreements as part of the 1945 Yalta Conference, which served as the basis for the forced repatriation of millions of soldiers and displaced citizens back to the Soviet Union and Yugoslavia. In effect, these forced repatriations sent millions to their deaths, by execution or life in the Gulag. Within these millions was the group of Slovenians who took refuge from Tito with the British army in Austria.

From May 21–31, 1945 12,000 the Slovenian soldiers were repatriated (many by force) to Yugoslavia. Upon their return they were tortured and killed en masse by Tito’s Partisans. Plans to repatriate the 6,000 Slovenians civilians were about to be implemented when word got back to the camp in Viktring about the fate of those who were sent back.

It was then that Major Barre stepped in, and alerted the British General in charge of the operation of what was happening. After a call to their superiors for advice, the order was given to stop all deportations. The lives of 6,000 Slovenians were saved from the murderous hands of Tito.
